

Billennium Jg Ballard Analysis

Peter Brigg examines the life and work of British author J.G. Ballard, from his science fiction to his mainstream fiction. Starmont Reader's Guide 26.

First published in 1978, this collection of nineteen of J. G. Ballard's best short stories is as timely and informed as ever. His tales of the human psyche and its relationship to nature and technology, as viewed through a strong microscope, were eerily prescient and now provide greater perspective on our computer-dominated culture. Ballard's voice and vision have long served as a font of inspiration for today's cyber-punks, the authors and futurists who brought the information age into the mainstream.

Originally published in 1976, Martin Bax's seminal cult novel is back in print after three decades. Ballard will always be the schoolboy in Steven Spielberg's movie *Empire of the Sun*, struggling to survive as an internee of the Japanese during World War II.
