Chapter 6 is not found in any other evolution textbook, although there are a number of recent books on the subject, and it therefore provides an introductory overview of a topic that has been the object of much recent interest and promises to generate much more insight: the expression of genetic variation analysed with the concept of reaction norms. Chapters 7-9 cover sex, life histories, and sexual selection in greater depth than they are dealt with in any other introductory textbook but without

introducing advanced technical language and analysis. Chapters 6-9 thus give unprecedented coverage to phenotypic evolution in an introductory text. Chapter 10 on multilevel selection and genetic conflict is unique in introductory textbooks. Rolf Hoekstra has achieved a wonder of clarity and concision on the essentials of this exciting topic. Chapters 11 and 12 on speciation and systematics are, by comparison, pretty standard, but they continue the policy of clarity and concision with the focus on essentials. Chapter 13 on the history of the planet and of life is a completely new approach unabashedly designed to motivate students to think about deep time, geology, paleontology, and fossils. Chapter 14 on the major transitions in evolution is also not found in any other introductory textbook. It documents the conceptual issues raised in the history of life briefly and in a form that will stimulate the gifted. Chapter 15 profiles the chief insights made possible by molecular systematics in the form of four case studies ranging from deep time to recent European history. It has standard content but unique structure. A strong point is the way mitochondrial Eve is contrasted with transspecies polymorphism to show students how to think about inferences with molecular evidence. Chapter 16 briefly presents the principle comparative methods and the kinds of insights that can be achieved with them. It is not unique - Ridley covers this ground well - but the examples used are new and the essential features of the methods - including potential pitfalls - are quite clearly described. Chapter 17 places evolutionary thought into the context both of the natural sciences and of society at large.

biography of Dostoevsky, covers the six most remarkably productive years in the novelist's entire career. It was in this short span of time that Dostoevsky produced three of his greatest novels--Crime and Punishment, The Idiot, and The Devils--and two of his best novellas, The Gambler and The Eternal Husband. All these masterpieces were written in the midst of harrowing practical and economic circumstances, as Dostoevsky moved from place to place, frequently giving way to his passion for roulette. Having remarried and fled from Russia to escape importuning creditors and grasping dependents, he could not return for fear of being thrown into debtor's prison. He and his young bride, who twice made him a father, lived obscurely and penuriously in Switzerland, Germany, and Italy, as he toiled away at his writing, their only source of income. All the while, he worried that his recurrent epileptic attacks were impairing his literary capacities. His enforced exile intensified not only his love for his native land but also his abhorrence of the doctrines of Russian Nihilism--which he saw as an alien European importation infecting the Russian psyche. Two novels of this period were thus an attempt to conjure this looming spectre of moral-social disintegration, while The Idiot offered an image of Dostoevsky's conception of the Russian Christian ideal that he hoped would take its place.

In this chapter we ask a number of questions regarding the brain's realization of reward-based decision making: 1) What is the right mathematical framework to capture the actual choice learning sequences of animals? 2) How are the crucial variables for multi-step decision making, such as the action value, the history of choice, strategy for multi-step behavior and the reward prediction errors processed in the brain? 3) What is the brain's mechanism for the decision to pursue a delayed reward or to abandon it? We first show that some extension to the standard reinforcement learning framework is necessary for capturing the actual choice sequences of animals, which often include episodes of the win-stay-lose-shift strategy as well as history of choices and their value. In a multi-step choice task of monkeys, the neurons in the striatum encode the action values and the putamen plays a critical role in history-based action selection.

Furthermore, the midbrain dopamine neurons represent the sum of the immediate and expected multiple future rewards and its prediction errors. In a delayed reward task in rats, waiting for delayed reward was associated with both higher level of serotonin release and sustained higher firing of serotonin neurons in the dorsal raphe nucleus.

The two roles of the lower urinary tract are storage of urine and emptying at appropriate times. Optimal and coordinated activity of the bladder and urethra is subject to complex neural control which involves all levels of the nervous system, from cortex to peripheral nerve. This explains the high prevalence of urinary disturbances in neurological disease. Information obtained from history taking and supplemented by use of a bladder diary forms the cornerstone of evaluation. Ultrasonography is used to assess the degree of incomplete bladder emptying, and for assessing the upper tracts. Urodynamic tests, with or without simultaneous fluoroscopic monitoring, assess detrusor and bladder outlet function and give fundamental information about detrusor pressure and thus the risk of upper tract damage. Impaired emptying is most often managed by clean-intermittent self-catheterization, which should be initiated if the postvoid residual urine exceeds one-third of bladder capacity or is greater than 100mL, or rarely if spontaneous voiding is dangerous due to high detrusor pressure. Storage symptoms are most often managed using antimuscarinic medications.

Intradetrusor injection of botulinum toxin type A is emerging as an effective treatment for managing detrusor overactivity. Understanding of the underlying mechanism of lower urinary tract dysfunction is crucial for effective management. In pioneer America, the Michigan Central Railroad (MCRR) became the major route between east and west, linking older states and their restless populations to

young cities like Detroit and Chicago, and to the wide open spaces beyond.
